Archaeological Survey at Dundas

Notes on archaeological features at Dundas - August 2006 -



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On August 9, 2006, G. LeMoine, John Darwent and Micah Hale surveyed the area around the old metal dump northeast of Dundas Mountain for archaeological features that might be impacted by planned work to clean up the dump. We walked the area from the existing road to the foot of Dundas Mountain, identifying six archaeological features.

The area immediately around the dump is very disturbed, primarily by the creation of the dump itself. Large areas of gravel have been moved and a road is visible, although no longer marked on maps. (*photos* AU 9 2006 -1 through 5 and dump road.jpg)

Conclusion: No archaeological sites are likely to be impacted by activity to clean up the dump, assuming the old road is used to provide access.

A list of the identified features follows.

Features 1 and 2 are on the slope above the dump, to the southwest.

The remaining features are on the plain between the dump and the modern road/parking area.

The caches are associated with rocky outcrops, which have probably prevented vehicular traffic from damaging them.

Eastings, northings, and elevations are from our GPS unit – we have found that the eastings and northings are accurate, but the elevations are approximations only.

TAB1 Tent ring

Rectangular outline with flat rocks, estimated 4m E/W x 3m N/S No artefacts despite long search, no bone, very light vegetation. Unknown time period.

TAB2 Tent ring

Easting	Northing	Zone	Elevation□

Rectangular pavement of stones, driven through by truck, estimated $4.5 \text{m E/W} \times 4 \text{m N/S}$, south half paved.

No artefacts, not bone, light vegetation, time period unknown. Some risk of more vehicles. Note that this feature is essentially at the same elevation as no. 1. *Photos* AU 9 2006 -8 and -9

TAB3 Hunter's bed

Easting	Northing	Zone	Elevation□

Hunter's bed, small ring on the south side of a large boulder, 2m E/W x1m N/S, light vegetation. Slumping downhill.

Artefacts: wooden stake and burnt blubber encrusted stone.

Thule/historic period.

TAB4 Tent ring

Easting	Northing	Zone	Elevation□

Destroyed tent ring. Large equipment tracks through it.

Possible midpassage present, amorphous shape, estimated 3m diameter. Light vegetation, no bone.

No prehistoric artifacts present, but some glass chips.

TAB5 Cache and cache complex

Cache, opened. 2m x 1.5 m, long axis NW/SE. 2 sea mammal bones outside, heavy vegetation surrounding it. Well constructed.

No artifacts

Unknown time period.

TAB5b Cache complex. 5 closely associated caches near TAB5, all opened. Size range -1-1.5 m diameters.

Unknown time period, some seem recent. See diagram for relative positions. *Photos* AU 9 2006 -14 through -19

TAB6 Cache

Cache 3x2m oval, NW/SE long axis. Opened

Unknown time period, no bone present, heavy vegetation.

No obvious risk.
